THE SCHOOL

Antelope High School is a public comprehensive school located in the community of Antelope, California. Antelope is primarily a suburban middle class community. Antelope High school serves grades 9-12 and as of 2012 is fully accredited by the Western Association of Schools and Colleges (WASC).

Antelope High School operates on a four-by-four block schedule, with the school year split into two 18-week terms. Students are enrolled in four classes each term, which is equivalent to two traditional semesters. Therefore, each semester-long course at Antelope High School is equal to a yearlong course in a traditional high school.

The student population for 2016-2017 is approximately **1,828** students with a senior class of **438**.

MARKING SYSTEM

Letter grades of A, B, C, D, and F are used. A cumulative grade point average is computed using 4.0+ scale, and includes all work completed in grades 9 through 12. Student transcript includes both weighted and unweighted GPA as well as a 9 through 12 Academic GPA, which excludes all physical education grades and a 10 through 12 Academic GPA, which excludes freshman year grades, as well as all physical education grades. All Advanced Placement, Honors, and board approved community college classes are given weighted credit. If a course is repeated, the higher grade is calculated into the GPA.
