# Financial Aid

Yes! You CAN afford college at a California community college. There are several ways to get financial assistance if you need it, including **federal financial aid, fee waivers, loans, grants, and scholarships.**

When you've seen enough to get started, **go ahead and apply for the most popular forms of financial assistance below, the FAFSA (or, if AB540, the California Dream Act), and the California Promise Grant** (formerly known as the *BOG Fee Waiver*).

## How Do I Apply for Financial Aid?

**Everyone interested in getting financial assistance to attend a California community college should look at submitting applications for the FAFSA (or, if AB540, the California Dream Act) and the California Promise Grant** formerly known as the *BOG Fee Waiver*. The FAFSA (Free Application for Federal Student Aid) makes available several types of loans and grants from the federal government, while the California Promise Grant can waive enrollment fees for qualified students. (The California Dream Act helps AB540 eligible students obtain FREE money from the state of California.)
