## MISSION STATEMENT

Granite Bay High School is a positive learning community of high expectations that prepares all students for post-secondary success.

## SCHOOL AND COMMUNITY

A public suburban high school located in Granite Bay, fifteen miles north of Sacramento, the attendance area of GBHS serves the community of Granite Bay as well as the southeastern part of the city of Roseville. Situated on a beautiful campus featuring state-of-the-art technology, multiple athletic venues, and a 500 -seat performing arts theater, the school is the centerpiece of the community. Economically, it is primarily a middle to upper class community. The school, which serves grades 9-12, opened in the fall of 1996. It is one of five comprehensive high schools in the Roseville Joint Unified High School District.

## HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ACADEMIC PROGRAM

- GBHS has a robust college and career preparatory focus providing students with multiple pathways for students to achieve secondary success.
- GBHS is on a four-by-four block schedule with the school year split into two 18 -week terms.
- Students enroll in four classes each term.
- Each term is equivalent to two traditional semesters. Therefore, each semester-long course at GBHS is equal to a yearlong course in a traditional high school.
- GBHS students score higher in CAASPP English and math exams than Placer County and RJUHSD high schools.
- Students choose from 22 Advanced Placement courses.
- GBHS is part of the $1 \%$ of high schools nationwide who have true equity in the

## MARKING SYSTEM

Letter grades $=A, B, C, D, F$ are used. Cumulative GPA is computed using a $4.0+$ scale and includes all work completed in grades 9 through 12. The transcript includes both weighted and unweighted GPA as well as a State GPA which excludes freshman grades as well as all P.E. grades. AP, IB, Honors, and some community college classes that are Board-approved and transferable to the University of California are weighted. If a course is repeated, the higher grade is calculated into the GPA.
